Imposition of the Ashes

Participants are invited to come – a row at a time – to the center of the chancel rail. After the minister has placed the sign of the cross on your forehead, you are invited to kneel at the chancel rail. While there, confess a specific sin. Ask God's forgiveness. Then, when you are ready, return to your pew.
